Going, going, gone: Vote no on changes to Article VIII to preserve your rights

Since it's founding almost 50 years ago, the TYC bylaws have required that the board of directors submit proposed changes in dues and initiation fees to members for approval. At the November Annual Meeting you will be asked to vote yes for changes in Article VIII, which will allow dues to be put on "automatic increases" of five percent per year. (That benign sounding five percent adds up to a \$120 increase over four years.) And, most importantly, you may not be told in advance when an increase is being made, or why it is necessary.

What exactly is the problem the board is trying to fix? Is it too much trouble to ask members to approve dues increases, as all previous TYC boards have done?

Vote no on the changes to Article VIII. Preserve your right to have a say in club financial affairs.

Race notes

There are two races to report on since the last *Westerlies*: the Short-Handed Races, originally scheduled for October 4, and the Joan Storer Regatta on October 11.

Short-Handed Races

Ten boats registered for the Short-Handed Races on October 4, evidence of the popularity of these races. Unfortunately, the wind did not cooperate. Without wind, and with no sign of wind building, the races were postponed. After much discussion and consideration, it was decided to reschedule these races to October 18. That would allow for more boats to participate. Thanks to Eric Lyons and Susie Woodrum for serving as the first race committee on the 4th.

The second attempt to start the Short-Handed Races was no more successful than the first. Again, the start time was 12:00 but there was no wind, so we postponed for 30 minutes. While the wind did come up from the east, it was not enough to race and overcome the ebb tide. We checked every 30 minutes but by 2:30, decided to postpone the race once again. Only three boats had sailed to the start area, patiently drifting in the light air and tide before returning to their berths. Ironically, by 3:15 the wind was normal and would have been enough to start but didn't leave enough time to finish two races. Thanks to Floyd Fulmer and Paula Blake for serving as race committee.

The lesson learned from the Short-Handed Races is to schedule a later start time to avoid having boats wait in the start area for the late arriving winter wind.

Joan Storer Regatta

The Joan Storer Regatta is held in memory of a former TYC member. It is one of the few races on the Bay open only to women skippers and their crew. There may be one male aboard each entry but he may not touch the helm. Here is an excerpt from *Norcalsailing.com*'s race report:

Five boats started at 1:05 in a wind from the east and a growing flood tide. By 2:00, the wind shifted to a normal southwest direction. Susan Hoehler in Joyride was the fastest boat in the race, and the only one to fly a spinnaker. Mariellen Stern finished second in Cinnamon Girl, and Shirley Vaughan finished third in Red Hawk.

Unlike the South Bay the Sunday before, the North Bay cooked up a modest but consistent breeze with enough velocity to overcome a ripping flood. Due to the southeasterly wind direction, the course consisted of a one-tack beat,

followed by a broad reach, a jibe mark in the worst of the current, a broad reach on the opposite jibe, and a one-tack beat to the finish.

Susan Hoehler's J/105 Joyride was, by far, the fastest boat in the race, and the only one to fly a spinnaker. Despite the flood, Joyride ate up the rectangular 4.6-mile course in less than an hour.

Finishing in contact with each other were Shirley Vaughan's Hawkfarm Red Hawk, Mariellen Stern's cold-molded 26-footer Cinnamon Girl, and the C&C 29 Siento el Viento with a guest skipper at the wheel. All three experienced a 90-degree wind shift just before the finish line and had to tack to cross.

Thanks to Bill Hoehler and Gerry Gunn for serving as race committee.

Coming Up

Only three races remain this season: the Red Rock Race on November 1 (followed by the Race Awards Dinner), the Short-Handed Races, which need to be rescheduled for mid-November, and finally the Wild Turkey Race on November 28.

Support Recreational Boaters of California (RBOC)



TYC Dues notices will be in the mail soon and it is once again time to ask you to support RBOC by including a \$20 RBOC voluntary contribution when you send in your dues. RBOC volunteer directors from across the state contribute generously of their time, working with legislators on your behalf to oppose restrictive bills, supporting those that are beneficial and proposing changes where necessary to protect boater interests. They also work in partnership with *BoatUS* as it lobbies on your behalf at the federal level on boating-related issues.

During the past year RBOC has:

- Successfully lobbied against SB 623, legislation that proposed an outright ban on copper-based bottom paints. They continue to work with the State Water Quality Resources Board on implementing AB 425, which requires the Department of Pesticide Regulation to determine a leach rate for copper-based antifouling paint used on recreational vessels and to make recommendations for appropriate mitigation measures to protect aquatic environments from the effects of exposure to copper bottom paint.
- Supported SB 941, a boat operator certification requirement in California which will phase in over seven years. Operators of boats propelled by an engine will have to pass an approved boater education examination and obtain a vessel operator card issued by the Division of Boating and Waterways. Online courses such as the free *BoatUS* Foundation course will be an option. The phase-in starts in 2018 for those 20 years old and will apply to everyone by 2025. Fees for the certificates will be limited to covering the cost of the program.
- RBOC continues to work with the California Natural Resources Agency and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation to limit negative impacts on recreational boating by the Bay Delta Conservation Plan. They are lobbying for full mitigation of the negative impacts and assurances of reliable access to all Delta waterways by recreational boaters.
- > On the federal level, RBOC is working with *BoatUS* to limit EPA requirements for ethanol in gasoline.

A 2009 *BoatUS* article said, "RBOC is one of only a few statewide boating organizations in the country, and its record is unmatched by any other state boating group in the U.S." This and all of RBOC's work benefiting California boaters is done on a limited budget funded entirely by voluntary contributions like yours. All RBOC contributions are segregated and presented to RBOC at a regular PICYA delegate meeting.
